THE NCAA LANDSCAPE



2021

NIL Introduction - NCAA legalized NIL payments

- Athletes can benefit from endorsements & sponsorships
- First significant change to NCAA amateurism model
- "Economic" regulations challenged

2025 2026

Revenue Sharing Model - settlement June 6, 2025

- Allows direct athlete payments from schools
- Cap: \$20.5M/year (based Power schools), 1 July 2025
- Roster limits to replace scholarship limits (15 players)
- Third-party NIL deals must be reported if over \$600

*NCAA situation: highly dynamic, characterized by ongoing and unsolved litigation.



Shift from amateurism to professionalism

- Courts are reshaping college sports (still academic institutions under FIBA IR?)
- Top men's (and some women's) basketball players can earn \$170K-\$1M+ per year
- NIL is technically not supposed to be "Pay-for-Play", direct compensation from colleges to players.

2.8B

*Payment in back damages to athletes who competed in college from 2016 through present day.

> 400K current & former Division I athletes

*in addition to existing scholarships and other benefits.



- Reshapes the landscape of college sports prioritizing fairness, stability, integrity, and opportunity for student-athletes and institutions.
- Creation of a New Oversight Body
- Participating schools can distribute up to 22% of average revenue (from media rights, ticket sales, sponsorships).


College Sports Commission


- Independent organization
- Implements settlement terms for:
 - Revenue sharing
 - Student-athlete Name, Image, and Likeness (NIL) deals
 - Roster limits
 - Investigates violations
 - Determines penalties
 - Administers rules


HISTORIC NCAA SETTLEMENT



Revenue Sharing:











YR:1 = \$21.32M YR:2 = \$22.17M

HISTORIC NCAA SETTLEMENT



New Platforms for Management:

College Athlete Payment System (CAPS):

For managing and reporting institutional revenue sharing.

NIL Go: For student-athletes to report their third-party NIL deals, ensuring compliance based on valid business purpose and compensation range. (\$600 or more)

Scholarship & Rosters

- NCAA scholarship limits have been removed.
- Sport-specific roster limits have been established.
 Minimal impact in Basketball.

Challenges:

- For schools short timeframe to establish necessary infrastructure for new rules.
- The settlement does not address all legal questions, athletes vs employees or current playing time rules.
- Transition period with possible "bumps in the road"

CHALLENGES FOR INTERNATIONAL ATHLETE

Visa limitations

- F-1 visas restrict work opportunities
- Limited to on-campus employment
- NIL activities may violate visa terms

Knowledge gaps

- Lack of understanding about opportunities
- Confusion about permissible activities
- Limited guidance from home countries

Tax implications

- Complex dual-country taxation
- May trigger tax obligations in US & home country
- Limited financial literacy resources

Regulatory barriers

- Conflicting home country regulations
- NCAA compliance complexity- no standardized international framework

International Participation in NCAA

12.8%

of Division-I NCAA athletes are international students

International student-athletes have found ways to participate in NIL. They can sign deals back in their home countries or explore other visa options, but legal uncertainty remains high.

NMFs

- General concern about young players moving to the NCAA is moderate (stronger in Europe).
- Tendency to believe that NCAA offers better opportunities than domestic leagues in: sporting performance, educational opportunities, and personal growth.

IMPACT ON FIBA STAKEHOLDERS: CLUBS





Impact of NIL on clubs can **vary significantly** depending on factors such as the club's **financial resources**, **development model**, **and geographical location**.

Roster Planning

- Losing best young players
- Efforts to increase playing time ineffective

Finance & Development

- Considerable investments in youth development (1European Clubs)
- Loss of ROI when players leave for NCAA

IMPACT ON FIBA STAKEHOLDERS: PLAYERS





Financial Opportunities

ADVANTAGES

- •Significant \uparrow income via NIL
- •Up to \$1.2M in NIL
- Particularly attractive for female athletes

CONSIDERATIONS

- •Tax/visa challenges for international players
- Not all players receive equal opportunities/compensation



Educational Benefits

Advantages

- •Academic support resources
- •English language proficiency
- Cultural experience

CONSIDERATIONS

 Transfer portal undermines educational success



Development Factors

ADVANTAGES

- Exposure to U.S. style of play
- Athletic facilities and resources
- High-performance expectations

CONSIDERATIONS

- In some cases, domestic leagues offer higher level of competition
- Risks of sporting development for the sake of winning instantly



IMPACT ON FIBA STAKEHOLDERS:



Agent Involvement:

•Agents serve as intermediaries in NCAA recruiting processes, particularly for international players (and not under FIBA jurisdiction)

AGENTS

 Current regulations present varying degrees of oversight across different situations.

House v. NCAA

- Settlement:
 - •Direct compensation of athletes by colleges would introduce new considerations in the relationship between NIL deals and recruitment processes, particularly in contexts where agents participate in NIL

NCAA


- Placements:
- NIL agreements typically involve higher commission structures than contracts to "play" (employment)

Transfer Portal:

 Consideration of various factors: potential NIL opportunities, which can influence both athlete compensation and representation fees.

Educate all stakeholders on NCAA risks/benefits

Track player movements, and build alumni support platforms

Promote NCAA
